GOLF COURSE AVAILABILITY

All Members, Visitors and Guests must report to the Golf Shop prior to commencing their round. For information on the availability please check our online booking system app. Members can also phone the Golf Shop for information on social play or competition availability. In general, the availability of the course on a daily basis is as follows:

THIS SCHEDULE DETAILS THE AVAILABILITY OF THE GOLF COURSE THROUGHOUT THE WEEK.

On Monday, Friday, and Sunday, the course is open, but it's recommended to check with the Golf Shop for any specific updates.

On Tuesday and Thursday, the 1st Tee is reserved for competitions until 10 a.m., with social play permitted after that.

Wednesday and Saturday see the entire course dedicated to competitions until 12:30 p.m., after which social play can resume. This schedule helps players plan their visits, ensuring they can enjoy the course when it's available for social play.

All players must book all games of golf via the MiGolf System or contact the Golf Shop.

If cancelling a booking, please use the same channels.

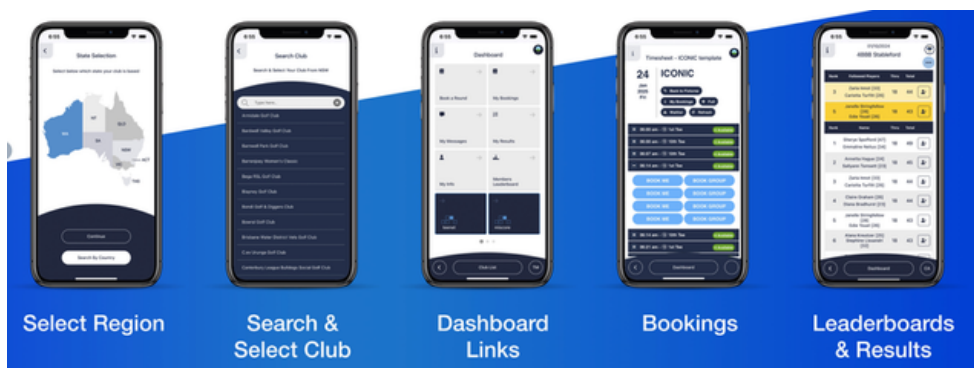

How to login to your Club's OneGolf system

Sign in with your login details. In most cases, your username will be your Club membership number (Usually the last 4 digits of your Club Golflink number stripping the leading zeros. i.e., 00654 becomes 654).

Your initial password is the DDMM of your DOB. If this fails, please try 0101. If you are a new member or are having trouble logging in, please contact your Club administrators for assistance.



PLAY FROM DESIGNATED TEES:



Competition and social golf are played from the designated tees as follows:

BLUE: Monthly Medal and Championship events

WHITE: Selected competitions such as day competitions, practice, and social rounds

RED: Selected competitions such as day competitions, practice, and social rounds

YELLOW: Selected competitions and social play for beginners, juniors and seniors

SECTION B – RULES OF THE CLUB

- Our Dress Code is aimed at achieving a neat and tidy appearance appropriate to golf. Members and Visitors should always appear neat and well dressed – dressing accordingly shows respect for yourself, your Club, and the game of golf. Members, Visitors, or guests presenting at the course not dressed appropriately may be refused a start. Our dress code is as follows:
- Shirts which are collared, crew neck, turtleneck and roll neck shirts (all preferably tucked in) are permitted. Women may wear shirt without sleeves.
- Women should wear tailored pants, shorts or skirts of medium length or golf dresses.
- Men should wear tailored pants or dress shorts.
- Jeans are permitted and must be neat and tidy. NOT FADED OR TORN
- Beach wear, T-shirts, football jumpers, football shorts, tracksuit pants are not permitted under any circumstances. Offensive wording on all clothing is not acceptable.
- Golf shoes are recommended to be worn when playing. Thongs, sandals, and work shoes with heels are strictly prohibited. Flat soled sandshoes or running shoes are permitted if a player does not have golf shoes.
- When in the Club House “neat Casual” is the expectation for dress of members and visitors.

RULE 2 – VISITORS PLAYING



- The following conditions shall apply to the introduction of playing Visitors:
- Visitors shall not be permitted to play on course on Saturdays without prior approval (except on Invitation Days).
- A member shall not introduce more than three playing visitors without approval.
- For competition purposes a visitor must be a member of a club affiliated with Golf Australia or similar interstate or overseas association affiliated with the controlling authority.
- A member shall play with his/ her visitor unless arranged with the match Committee.
- No person shall be introduced as a visitor on more than four (4) occasions in any one calendar year, except by permission of the Match Committee.
- A member introducing a visitor or guest to the club shall ensure visitors fees are paid before commencing a game.
- A member introducing a visitor or guest shall be responsible for the conduct of the visitor or guest both in the Clubhouse and on Course.
- A member shall not knowingly introduce as a visitor or guest or any person whose name has been expunged from the register of members of the club or who has been refused admission to membership of the Club or any other Club.

ETIQUETTE

Members are expected to pay close attention to:

- The Rules of golf
- The etiquette of the game
- The local rules; and
- Regulations governing conditions of play.

Etiquette is fundamental to the way members conduct themselves on the course. By following these rules, you are displaying respect for the golf course, fellow members, and visitors.



RULES 3 – PACE OF PLAY

During competition it is particularly important to be aware of one's position in the field. The Board expects that members will always implement the following practices.

- Players should make it their objective to complete their round of golf in 3hour and 45 minutes.
- Groups must always maintain their position in the field. This will ensure the field is compact and playing times will be kept to a minimum.
- Players searching for a ball should call through the group behind as soon as practical. The 3 minute search rule should be applied when searching for a players ball.
- Players are obligated to pick up immediately they realise that they will fail to score in a stableford or par event.
- Calling up on par three's is not permitted unless in the event a ball is lost or you are calling a faster group through, care should be taken to always ensure the safety of all players.
- To ensure an appropriate pace of play, ready golf should be adopted by all groups.
- When the play of the hole has been completed players should immediately leave the green and mark their cards at the next tee.
- Park buggies/carts on the side of hole closest to the next tee.



RULE 4 – CARE OF THE COURSE

- Do not traverse the putting green with a bag or buggy or place your bag and clubs on the putting green.
- Practice on any area of the course is limited to a maximum of two balls. Use practice areas provided should you wish to play more than two balls.
- Members should protect the trees and shrubs growing around the course.
- Players shall at all times co-operate with the course staff and allow them to perform their tasks. Course staff have the right of way on all areas of the course. Any abuse to course staff will not be tolerated.
- Players using suction or other devices to retrieve their golf balls from the hole should exercise care not to damage the hole.

The flagstick must be removed from the hole when retrieving your ball.

- Players should ensure that when dropping clubs, no damage is done to the putting green and that neither they nor their caddies damage the holes by standing close to the hole or when handling flagstick. The flagstick when removed from the hole should be handed to another player and not dropped or placed on the green. The flagstick should be properly replaced.
- A player should ensure that any divot is repaired/replaced immediately and sanded. A sand bucket should be carried at all times. Damage to the putting green (plug marks) are to be carefully repaired.
- Before leaving a bunker, a player should carefully rake the bunker in the direction that it faces the hole. Please leave the rake in the bunker with the handle facing the direction in which the hole is played.

RULE 5 – OTHER IMPORTANT ETIQUETTE



REQUIREMENTS

- No one shall move or stand close to or directly behind the ball or the hole while a player is addressing the ball or making a stroke, particularly when putting.
- No player shall play until the players in front are out of range. If a group fails to keep pace on the course and loses more than one clear hole on the players in front it must allow the group following to pass through. In the interest of all, players should play without delay.
- The lowest marker in each playing group is deemed to be responsible for the conduct and etiquette of the group, including the pace of play.

RULE 6 – THE NORTH SHORE RESIDENTIAL AREA

- Claremont Golf Club is located adjacent to the North Shore residential area. Please exercise caution when playing shots and undertaking socially acceptable behaviour. Every player has a OH&S responsibility to advise the Golf Shop if you feel your ball entered a property or crosses the "out of bounds" boundary on the 8th, 9th or 18th Hole
- Requirements are outlined on signage on these holes. QR codes are available for online forms.

RULE 7 – PRIORITY ON THE COURSE

- All competition play has priority.
- When you arrange a game, particularly over the weekend, call the Golf Shop first or check in the Events section of the club's website to see what is being played. If it is a stroke, stableford or par event the field will normally be playing in fours. Any variation to this will appear on the time sheet.
- If you can arrange your play with this in mind, you will not only conform to the requirements, but you will be able to play with rights equal to the remainder of the field. If you do not conform to the field groupings you must always give way to players following you, excepting in the case of single events where two has equal rights with the normal three or four.

RULE 8 – COMPETITION SCORING



- Prior to commencing play in competition, the entry fee should be paid and play registered via the miscore app.
- A score card issued by the starter or other authorised person must be obtained before playing in any competition and the required entry fee paid. All cards must be dated, signed by the marker and countersigned by the player. The score must then be entered into the computer in the Golf Shop immediately after the completion of the round. All cards must be returned for handicap purposes.
- Preference for recording scores is on the MiScore app.
- All competition play must be played from these tees of the day.
- During the times that the starter is on duty they shall be in full charge of the tees. All players must have their names entered on the booking sheet before commencing a round.

RULE 9 – HANDICAPPING AND DETERMINATION OF TIES

Stableford:

- Strokes are taken on the allocated of scoring: holes (after taking handicap into consideration). Two or more strokes over par: 0 points.

Match Play – Singles:

- The full difference between stroke play handicaps.

Handicap Variations:

- Par and Stableford Stroke handicap Canadian Foursomes $\frac{1}{2}$ combined handicaps Foursomes – Strokes $\frac{1}{2}$ combined handicaps (Half stroke to be used where applicable. Eg , $\frac{1}{2}$ combined handicap 37 = 18 $\frac{1}{2}$ not 19).

Ambrose:

- $\frac{1}{8}$ of the combined handicap for four players; $\frac{1}{6}$ of the combined handicap for 3 players; $\frac{1}{2}$ combined handicap for two players.



RULE 10 – POWER BUGGIES AND MOTOR BIKES

This rule includes all battery powered buggies, battery powered scooters propelled by means of a combustion engine and any other vehicle used as a buggy for the carriage of a player and golf clubs propelled by any means other than human power.

Buggies and Bikes are a privilege and subject to the following conditions:

- No person without a valid drivers licence can operate a cart/buggie.
- Buggies and bikes must not be driven on tees or greens or between bunkers and greens. Where a defined path exists, this must be used.
- Buggies and bikes must not be driven or be left within (5) metres of greens or tees. Where tees and greens are in close proximity buggies and bikes may not be operated when the noise may distract other players on the tee or green.
- Players using buggies or bikes must maintain their normal place in the field and will have no special priority.
- Rapid acceleration is to be avoided so as to avoid noise pollution and erosion.
- Visitors must obtain approval of the club official (Golf Shop) prior to use of a buggy or bike on the course and agree to comply with these rules.
- Persons using buggies or bikes should be covered by sufficient insurance to meet any circumstances that may arise.
- Any motorised buggy or bike used within the boundaries of the club must comply with specifications as laid down by the Board.
- Such buggies and bikes may only be used by licensed persons.
- Operators of all buggies and bikes must comply with any signage or line markings placed around the course on the direction that any such buggy or bike must take.
- The Match Committee can suspend this privilege at any time.



RULE 11 – PERSONAL PROPERTY AND INSURANCE


- The Club will not be liable for any loss or injury to the property of any member or visitor on the Club's premises. It is accepted that "reasonable risk" is taken when entering the golf course precincts.
- Golf clubs should not be left unattended outside the Clubhouse. Valuables should be locked away.
- Members and visitors must report any incident involving damage or likely damage caused by a ball being hit into private property to the Golf Shop or Club Official immediately a round has been completed. The identity of the person who strikes the ball is to be provided where it is known. Full details of requirements are in the relevant Club policies.
- Member's lockers – The security of the lockers is not the Clubs responsibility. Items of any value should not be stored or left in the lockers.

RULE 12 – COMPLAINTS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

- All complaint or recommendations should be made, in writing, to the office who will submit the same to the Board of Management.
- Under no circumstances shall a member or any guest reprimand an employee of the Club.
- No canvassing for donations, raffles or subscriptions is allowed unless approved by the Committee on specific days.

RULE 13 – PARKING

- To avoid inconvenience to members, cars are to be parked in the marked areas provided for this purpose in the car park. Parking is not permitted in the areas surrounding the Clubhouse.



RULE 14 – CHILDREN

- Unaccompanied children, other than junior members, are not allowed on the course

RULE 15 – ADVERTISING

- No pamphlet, advertisement or notice of any kind may be exhibited in the club without the permission of the Board of Management or approved delegate.


RULE 16 – ANIMALS

- No member may bring an animal on the course or in the Clubhouse, without the express authorisation for Club Management.

RULE 17 – GAMBLING

- No part of the Clubhouse whatsoever may be used for the purpose of organised betting. Any member conducting organised betting on the premises may be expelled. This does not apply to Board authorised Club activities relating to Bingo ticket machines or Raffles.

RULE 18 – RESIGNATION


- Any member intending to resign from the Club must advise the Club in writing to the office staff before 31st March – failure to do so will result in liability for subscription fees for the following year. Please refer to the Club policy on Resignations and Suspension of Membership.
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RULE 19 – NEW MEMBER

- It is the responsibility of the proposer and seconder, immediately a nominee is elected to membership, to see that each new member is introduced to other members, is advised of the rules governing the conduct of the club and above all, is sufficiently advanced knowledge of the rules of golf to be competent to perform the duty of marker of a fellow competitor. Please see that you play with your nominee until they are so equipped. New members with handicaps from other clubs must have their handicaps verified before they are eligible to participate in a competition.

RULE 20 – SMOKING

- The Club and members have an obligation to comply with Tasmanian legislation and Public Health requirements.
 - Smoking is not permitted on the Golf Course whilst competition is being played.
 - No smoking inside any part of the Clubhouse including Golf Shop and the Bar/Restaurant area. Smoking is only permitted in designated areas outside the Clubhouse.
 - Please dispose of cigarette butts in a safe and appropriate manner.
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HOUSE ACCOUNT POLICY

Background.

- Upon confirmation of membership, members are provided with a Membership card. The Claremont Golf Club manages prize payments via prize and house accounts and the accounts may also have additional funds added to them by a member.
- House accounts can only be used to purchase goods including meals and cannot be used for the payment of memberships, competition fees or other similar expenditure.
- All prizes from regular club competitions will be paid into prize/house accounts.
- Members may make personal contributions to their account. Personal contributions will be deemed spent first before the use of funds allocated from the prize pool or member subscriptions.
- Members may check the account balance and transactions via their OneGolf account.

Resignation

- Members who resign from the club.
 - Any account balances less than \$20 will be forfeited.
 - Other members may access their house account for three (3) calendar month after the effective date of resignation. Any remaining funds will be forfeited to the club.
 - Where there remains a large account balance or there has been a substantial personal contribution(s) CGC Management may use discretion on the issue of refunds or granting more time to spend the credit.
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- Members may also be offered the option of continuing as a social member which would provide an extended time to use the remaining credit.



HOUSE ACCOUNT POLICY

Death

- In the case of a member dying, the club will contact the estate or next of kin and offer three options.
- Full refund of the account balance.
- Access to the account for up to three (3) months.
- Forfeit the balance as a donation to the club.

Management of Balances

- CGC Administration will actively manage the process to ensure that our membership records, including house accounts are up to date
